- d. The College organized an interactive program on the International Yoga Day on 21. 06. 2018 to explain the idea of non-violence through interconnectedness of the mind and body.

2.14. Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC:

- ✚ IQAC of the College has envisioned various lecture programs and seminars and this has led to significant improvement in the academic atmosphere of the college.
- ✚ Documents related to various programs were managed by the IQAC of the College. For example, it regularly published a newsletter called *Impressions* for the benefit of stakeholders. The College prospectus was designed by it. New layout designs were introduced for better audience receptivity.
- ✚ For a deeper engagement of the students of the College with the faculties, out of the class talks and activities were designed. Interactive sessions with the student including group discussions, role play, play enactments along with lectures of how to prepare seminar papers were organized.

- ✚ With a view of promoting clean and green environment, a cleanliness drive program viz, “Swach Bharat” was organized by Damdama College which was enthusiastically participated by the students and teachers alike.
- ✚ An arts gallery was set up for students with special qualities in the fine arts.
- ✚ The IQAC regularly organized awareness program and campaign on various women issues like menstrual hygiene, intimate hygiene and health.
- ✚ Under a ‘happy classroom’ concept, a music and meditation room was set up. The idea was borrowed from the student involvement and participation witnessed in the schools of the Delhi NCR. Through story-telling, films etc., students were exposed to the beauty of gender equality, religious and racial tolerance and respect for the differently able.

- (a) In order to make teaching, learning more interactive and lively, students were encouraged to participate in lecture presentations on certain topics in the class.
- (b). Group discussions, seminars, course related quizzes, periodical tests ensure that learning is not rote learning but can be related to practical, day to day circumstances.
- (c) Remedial classes were organized to help academically weak students.
- (d) With a view of instilling and nurturing creativity activities such as Student Parliaments, art fairs, drama workshops, pronunciation and vocabulary building classes were encouraged.

Group discussions and peer classrooms are other methods used in making classrooms student centric and lively. Alongside, the usual method of lecture, the College has a policy of home assignments beginning from Semester I students. Hands on experience are in the pipeline for Semester VI students. This option will be available to the final semester students only.

6.3.3

Examination and Evaluation

The college follows the Semester system as prescribed by the Gauhati University. It carries out Sessional examinations, which is of 20 marks. Apart from these, students are also evaluated by various departments periodically. The results of these internal examinations are discussed with both the students and their guardians. The University of Gauhati sets question papers for the rest 80 marks at the end of the semester. The College collaborates with the affiliating University in the organization of these examinations. An examination committee distributes the schedule for the examination papers to the faculty members and allots invigilation duties in accordance. With respect to the evaluation process, faculties are informed about their set of duties. These include maintaining confidentiality in all matters.

6.3.4

Research and Development

The College has a **Research Committee** devoted to the development of research and incubation ideas. With the view of encouraging the creativity of the young budding minds the college magazine; “Kachioli” is issued annually. Here the writings from the students as well as the teachers are published and many of articles provide much insightful knowledge pertaining to the rich socio- cultural history of the surrounding region. A solely hand written and illustrated magazine, “ Nou-Jyoty” is also being brought out by the students.

6.3.5 **Library and physical infrastructure / instrumentation**

- ✚ Library is fully automated.
- ✚ Book bank facility is available for the economically weak students.
- ✚ Online e-journals and e-book access facility is available for the students and teachers under N-LIST consortium of INFLIBNET Centre.
- ✚ New text books as per semester syllabus have been added.
- ✚ New reference and competitive examination books for the students have been added.
- ✚ New subject journals, popular magazines, weeklies are subscribed regularly.
- ✚ Back volumes are kept for references.
- ✚ Free internet facility is given to the students for accessing online e-contents.
- ✚ OPAC terminal is available for the students and teachers.
- ✚ Student and teachers can search and reserve book through OPAC.
- ✚ A separate corner for career book is opened for the students.
- ✚ New books are displayed in the book case near the entrance of the stack area to motivate our student and staff to read new arrivals.

- ✦ Institutional Digital Repository has been developed using Digital Library Software Dspace where institutional publications are made available digitally for use by the students and faculty members.

Physical Infrastructure

- ✦ College library is functioning through LAN.
- ✦ Wi-Fi internet access facility is available in the library and Principle's chamber.
- ✦ The college library is under CCTV surveillance.
- ✦ Laptops, projectors, display screens are procured to make the seminar, workshop as well as class room presentation lively and interactive.
- ✦ Computer Lab has 12 No's of computers with internet facility for use of students.
- ✦ One biometric device is strictly maintained for ensuring effective presence of both teaching and non-teaching staff in the college
- ✦ College administration is automated. The staffs are being given training on various aspects of automation and office management

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The College has a clearly established policy on appointment of staff, their training and development, compensation and handling of grievances. The Principal of the College takes personal initiative in maintaining and streamlining the resources. For example, every new faculty appointed is requested to go through a mandatory training period in teaching, learning pedagogy. Such incentives are also available to the office staff.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff Recruitment

With respect to faculty and staff recruitment, the College also has a clearly laid out policy. Every faculty recruitment is done as per Government of Assam and UGC guidelines. A roster of working staff is present with the administration. This Rooster is prepared in advance after taking due cognizance of the number of staffs as per their social category. Advertisements are given local news dailies and eligible candidates shortlisted and called for interview before a well deputed board, consisting of the Principal of the College, Departmental Head, subject experts and nominees of the VC. The recommendation of the Board is final and binding.

6.3.8. Industry Interaction / Collaboration

It is expected that with various MOU's coming up with industry bodies etc, including those from media etc. students of the College will have a rewarding work/job experience while preparing for their studies. Nonetheless, the long absence of a regular Principal for the institution alongside with the lack of funds from any sponsoring bodies much that was once envisioned for the

College has not been achieved. Nonetheless, the faculties are taking a personal initiative in working some sort of solution in this direction.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The College admits students as per the guidelines of the Gauhati University for admissions in the UG streams. At the same time, the website of the College, as also notable local newspapers carry information about dates of form fill up, short-listing of candidates in the website and date of admission as also the fees required for the same. Candidates can decide on their choice after going through the College Prospectus, which is available both in print and the e-edition.

7.1. Innovations and Best Practices

The College strives to inculcate new ideas both in academics and extra-curricular activities. In order to develop and nurture its own resources, the College has requested its faculties to speak on various issues and give seminar talks on subjects that interest them. This practice helps the faculties to present their ideas before a large, multi-disciplinary audience and for the spectators to integrate knowledge and information from different subject perspective.

At the same time, to augment a spirit of scholarship and love of books among the students, faculties and students practice book reviews, poem recitations, storytelling etc. The idea is to bring the world of books closer to students and faculties. After such readings etc., books are presented to the College library, which the College subsequently purchases for the benefit of readers.

To make classrooms more informal, lectures are sometimes given outside classrooms. The College has a beautiful pond within its campus and its banks provide adequate opportunities for classes outside.

The College has envisioned using platforms like You Tube etc to publicize selected class lectures for the benefit of students and the larger learner's community. Films are also screened as part of efforts to enrich the curriculum.

The College also has a theater hall. New and aspiring local playwrights are given opportunity to stage there plays here. This hall also serves as an important facility for open debates, music competitions etc.

The College lays stress on decentralized administration. This has helped the institution develop quick and efficient decision making. There is also a great level of transparency. The following are the committees of the College.

The committee members meet frequently to address important issues. For example, tenders for the scientific equipments and apparatus etc for the new Science Steam always needs the approval of both the Academic and Purchase committee.

There is also a cell devoted entirely to the safety and security of woman. This is the Cell against Sexual Harassment. All woman students are seen in high regard. All this could be part of the culture of upbringing in the local community as also the stringent efforts by teacher to continue with a good tradition. Nonetheless, if and when necessary, complaints made by woman are examined by the Principal and the Academic Committee also side the cell against harassment.

All efforts are made to arrive at a balanced opinion, while maintaining the dignity and respected of girl students in all aspects.

The School Hour in the Library: Every small child wishes to be in college and have interest among other things in turning pages of a big book in a big library. Unfortunately, not many can complete their education. To look into such gaps in a student's expectation and his usual academic life, the College has decided to open its library for a day, for the benefit of school children. This opportunity is available to students of nearby school, who upon producing an identity card can browse through the central library and look for books. In this way, their love for learning can be easily satiated, while their chances of developing a relationship with books remain a lifelong possibility. This is the school hour for the library.

Research

Research and the incubation of new ideas can greatly enhance the excitement of learning. At the same time, it can boost efforts of translating ideas and values into the practices of everyday life. The study into now forgotten languages, food and culture etc. can help reassess historical facts in a new light. Similarly, experiments in new theater etc can provide an opportunity to engage with the issues of life for greater insight. The benefits of such study can also be translated to the nation's mission of preservation and continuation of ideals.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The maintenance and running of many of the projects require a good amount of finance. Also, the level of motivation required to fulfill many of our social obligations is lacking often. Nonetheless, the linking of extracurricular activities with career goals has helped to win over the faculties as also students. Once they understand the usefulness and purpose of their activities, they remain true and faithful to the greater mission of a common good.

Research in an affiliated rural institution always requires long time commitment and motivation. Resource generation in humanities is always meager. At the same time, the difficulties of pursuing high caliber study for the benefit of society is now easily rewarding and is also finance dependent.

(SWOT Analysis)

Strengths:

1. Regular classes are held by the faculty members and priority is given on completion of syllabus.
2. The College has a large campus with ample possibilities of constructing new classrooms and requisite infrastructure for the betterment of teaching learning process.
3. Despite the large number of institutions of higher learning in and around the surrounding area, Damdama College can still expect a large student enrolment from feeder schools nearby.
4. The location of the College can also help this in this regard because it is well connected to the main city center just by a few kilometers.
5. There is still a large population of poor students nearby who because they cannot go to the main city would find this College suitable for their academic needs.
6. The library of the College can work as a hub of academic activity. It has a large number of books and journals for a very rewarding reading and learning experience. The library is fully automated and is using the latest Soul 2.0 software for managing reading materials. Students and teachers can access e-resources through the N-LIST consortium of INFLIBNET Centre, Ahmedabad.
7. The Science Stream of the College is all set to begin from this academic year. The Government of Assam has already sanctioned the requisite funds for infrastructure development, purchase of books and necessary equipments for the same.
8. The NSS wing of the College carries out a large number of extension activities from the empowerment of village woman and other marginal communities. It has adopted a nearby village and is also engaged in giving guidance to young children there.
9. Students of the institution are being trained in PI, GD and preparation of CV's by competent faculties and also resource persons invited from designated institutes around Guwahati.
10. Financial assistance is being provided to poor students. Book bank is also available to students.
11. Seminars/Conferences and workshops are being regularly held for the improvement of teaching learning experience. The faculty of the College is actively involved in one to one correspondence with the students. Doubt clearing sessions are also regularly held. Tutorials and remedial classes are organized for students who are academically weak.
12. The Principal of the College is a recognized Ph.D guide in Economics in the University of Gauhati.

Weakness

1. A large number of classrooms are without ICT facilities. This hampers the use of technology in classrooms.
2. The Classrooms available in the College need to be revamped. New Classrooms have to be constructed.
3. Placement and campus recruitment of students are poor.
4. Lack of value added courses.
5. The academic performance by Students admitted is not as expected.
6. Faculty rooms are not fully furnished. There is also a lack of infrastructure like computers and printers for faculties
7. The absence of a Permanent Principal had for long hampered the possibilities of funds from Central funding agencies.
8. Auditorium and theater hall of the College is not fully furnished. In fact, most of these facilities are being run on a make shift basis.
9. Consultancy services are poor. The College has not been able to engage regularly with reputed consultants for lack of funds.
10. In case of medical emergency, students and faculties have to go at least five kms to avail treatment.

Opportunities

1. The locals have a strong tradition of agriculture and of harvesting fish. With proper training and courses on horticulture, floriculture and pisciculture, a scope for income generation for the youth is plausible.
2. A large number of students are interested in extra-curricular activities. If proper training and opportunities are allowed, they would fare very well in their professional life.
3. The College has a rich tradition of theater activities. They are likewise interested in painting and photography. This skill related courses can attract a large number of students to the College.
4. Introduction of Post Graduate Courses in departments having Major subjects can again ease the burden of students moving to the main city center.
5. Entrepreneurship programs can also add to the employability of students.
6. Many students of the College are engaged as defense personnel and in the Police department. Training such likeminded students in the College can also increase the output.
